SCRIPTURE READINGS: SUNDAY, NOV. 19, 2023

Ephesians 2:14-22 (Epistle)

BRETHREN, For he is our peace, who has made us both one, and has broken down the dividing wall of hostility, by abolishing in his flesh the law of commandments and ordinances, that he might create in himself one new man in place of the two, so making peace, and might reconcile us both to God in one body through the cross, thereby bringing the hostility to an end. And he came and preached peace to you who were far off and peace to those who were near; for through him we both have access in one Spirit to the Father. So then you are no longer strangers and sojourners, but you are fellow citizens with the saints and members of the household of God, built upon the foundation of the apostles and prophets, Christ Jesus himself being the cornerstone, in whom the whole structure is joined together and grows into a holy temple in the Lord; in whom you also are built into it for a dwelling place of God in the Spirit.

Luke 8:41-56 (Gospel)

And there came a man named Ja'irus, who was a ruler of the synagogue; and falling at Jesus' feet he besought him to come to his house, for he had an only daughter, about twelve years of age, and she was dying.

As he went, the people pressed round him. And a woman who had had a flow of blood for twelve years and had spent all her living upon physicians and could not be healed by anyone, came up behind him, and touched the fringe of his garment; and immediately her flow of blood ceased. And Jesus said, "Who was it that touched me?" When all denied it, Peter said, "Master, the multitudes surround you and press upon you!" But Jesus said, "Someone touched me; for I perceive that power has gone forth from me." And when the woman saw that she was not hidden, she came trembling, and falling down before him declared in the presence of all the people why she had touched him, and how she had been immediately healed. And he said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace."

While he was still speaking, a man from the ruler's house came and said, "Your daughter is dead; do not trouble the Teacher anymore." But Jesus on hearing this answered him, "Do not fear; only believe, and she shall be well." And when he came to the house, he permitted no one to enter with him, except Peter and John and James, and the father and mother of the child. And all were weeping and bewailing her; but he said, "Do not weep; for she is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him, knowing that she was dead. But taking her by the hand he called, saying, "Child, arise." And her spirit returned, and she got up at once; and he directed that something should be given her to eat. And her parents were amazed; but he charged them to tell no one what had happened.

A vote would need to take place (possibly at the next annual meeting in June 2024) before any change to the calendar would take place. Please note, only those parishioners in good standing (have paid their yearly dues/diocese fee of \$105 per person) will be able to participate in this vote to change the parish calendar. We need everyone's input regarding this topic and more importantly your support of the Church. The \$105 fee per parishioner is money we take out of our parish treasury and send to the Consistory to support the Ukrainian Orthodox Church of the United States of America.

--SUNDAY, DECEMBER 17 - St. Nicholas Day Children's Celebration

THE ICONS OF THE PATRON SAINTS OF THE YOUTH OF THE UOC OF THE USA - HOLY MARTYRS CHRISTINA AND JULIAN BLESSED AND DISTRIBUTED TO THE PARISH COMMUNITIES OF THE CHURCH DURING THE ANNUAL CLERGY CONFERENCE



Earlier in the year, under the direction of Mrs. Natalie Kapeluck-Nixon, Director of the UOC Youth Ministry, the children cast their votes to pick two patron saints for the youth of the Church. Much consideration went into the voting process, ensuring that the lives of the various saints were read and understood. After the ballots were counted, the Director announced that Saints Christina of Tyre and Saint Julian of Tarsus would be the patron saints of the youth of the UOC of the USA.

Holy Martyr Christina lived during the third century in Tyre, modern-day Lebanon. Her father, governor of Tyre, wanted the exceptionally beautiful girl to be a pagan priestess. He, therefore, placed her at age 11 in a tower with gold and silver idols. St. Christina begged God to reveal Himself and was visited by an angel who revealed Christ to her. St. Christina smashed all the idols and as a result endured many tortures at the hands of her father, including beatings, being burned, and having a large stone put around her neck in an attempt to drown her at sea. Each time an angel protected her. In terror, her father ascribed this to sorcery and he decided to execute her in the morning. That night he suddenly died. Subsequent governors subjected St. Christina to many more cruel tortures including cutting off her tongue. The martyr took her tongue and threw it in the governor's face, and he was instantly blinded. Finally, the torturers executed St. Christina with a sword.

The Holy Martyr Julian of Tarsus was born in the Asia Minor province of Cilicia. He was the son of a pagan senator, but his mother was a Christian. After the death of her husband the mother of Saint Julian moved to Tarsus, where her son was baptized and raised in Christian piety.

When Julian reached age 18, a persecution against Christians began under the emperor Diocletian (284-305 AD). Among those arrested was Saint Julian. They brought him before the governor Marcian for trial, and for a long time they urged him to renounce Christ. Neither tortures nor threats, nor promises of gifts and honors could convince the pious youth to offer pagan sacrifice and deny Christ. The holy confessor remained steadfast in his firm faith.

For a whole year they led the martyr through the cities of Cilicia, everywhere subjecting him to interrogation and tortures, after which they threw him in prison. After continued imprisonment and the young man's refusal to deny Christ, they tied the Martyr Julian into a sack, filled with sand and poisonous snakes and scorpions, and threw him into the sea. The body of the sufferer was carried by the waves to the shores of Alexandria, where it was found by Christians and given a proper burial.

Through the intercession and example of these two young martyrs the youth of the Church have strong mentors and protectors. In today's ever darkening society, the youngest members of the Church are continuously faced with difficult decisions and situations. It is easy to get lost in all the propaganda and misinformation they are exposed to. Therefore, more than ever, it is crucial that the Church continue to pray for the safety and salvation of the children of the Church.

An icon of the two young martyrs was commissioned and written by Church iconographer Michael Kapeluck. Copies were made of the icon and during the evening service, the hierarchs blessed them all before distributing them

to the clergy present in order to be taken back with them to their home parishes. In addition to the regularly served Akathist to the Birth-Giver of God – the Nurturer of Children served monthly, additional services and prayers will be raised to benefit the youth, to grant them wisdom, guidance, integrity, maturity and dedication to Christ and His teachings, and not to wander off the narrow path which leads them to salvation.

Your holy martyr Julian, O Lord, through his suffering has received an incorruptible crown from You, our God. For having Your strength, he laid low his adversaries, and shattered the powerless boldness of demons. Through his intercessions save our souls!

TROPAR (St. Christina)

O Lord Jesus, unto Thee Thy lamb doth cry with a great voice: O my Bridegroom, Thee I love; and seeking Thee, I now contest, and with Thy baptism am crucified and buried. I suffer for Thy sake, that I may reign with Thee; for Thy sake I die, that I may live in Thee: accept me offered out of longing to Thee as a spotless sacrifice. Lord, save our souls through her intercessions since Thou art great in mercy.

During the Nativity Fast the Church encourages us to intensify our spiritual lives in order to ready our souls and bodies for the Feast. We do this through fasting, prayer, alms-giving, confession and increased attention given to "preparing for His coming", to make sure we've done what we can to make a "fit dwelling place for Him" in our hearts and lives.

The Purpose of Fasting

The purpose of fasting is to focus on the things that are above, the Kingdom of God. It is a means of putting on virtue in reality, here and now. Through it we are freed from dependence on worldly things. We fast faithfully and in secret, not judging others, and not holding ourselves up as an example.

- Fasting in itself is not a means of pleasing God. Fasting is not a punishment for our sins. Nor is fasting a means of suffering and pain to be undertaken as some kind of atonement. Christ already redeemed us on His Cross. Salvation is a gift from God that is not bought by our hunger or thirst.
- We fast to be delivered from carnal passions so that God's gift of Salvation may bear fruit in us.
- We fast and turn our eyes toward God in His Holy Church. Fasting and prayer go together.
- Fasting is not irrelevant. Fasting is not obsolete, and it is not something for someone else. Fasting is from God, for us, right here and right now.
- Most of all, we should not devour each other. We ask God to "set a watch and keep the door of our lips."

Fasting Periods


The Nativity Fast is one of the four Canonical Fasting Seasons in the Church year. This is a joyous fast in anticipation of the Nativity of Christ. That is the reason it is less strict than other fasting periods. The fast is divided into two periods.


- 1. **November 28th through January 1st** the traditional fasting discipline (no meat, dairy, fish, wine, and oil) is observed. There is dispensation given for wine and oil on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Similarly, fish, wine, and oil are permitted on Saturdays and Sundays.
- 2. **January 2nd through January 6th** traditional fasting discipline (no meat, dairy, fish, wine, and oil) is observed. There is dispensation given for wine and oil only on Saturday and Sunday during this period.

Please note that this is the letter of the tradition and certain allowances should be made for the occasional suspension of the severity of the fast, not as an excuse for laxity or indulgence, but when love requires. When in doubt, talk to your priest!

When Not to Fast

- between January 7 and January 18th (even on Wednesdays and Fridays);
- if you are pregnant or nursing a newborn;
- during serious illness;
- without prayer;
- without alms-giving;
- according to your own will without guidance from your spiritual father.







St. Philip Fast in Anticipation of the Nativity of our Savior!

Dearly beloved Clergy, Monastics and Faithful of the Ukrainian Orthodox Churches beyond the borders of Ukraine and those of our Holy Church in Ukrainian lands:

CHRIST IS AMONG US!

We have begun the Fast of St. Philip, called such because it commences the day after the Feast of St. Philip the Apostle, which falls on 27 November (14 November on the Gregorian or New Calendar) and continues through the Eve of the Holy Feast of the Nativity of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ on 6 January (24 December on the Gregorian Calendar).

During this time of spiritual journey, we are to seek the ways in which we can place our lives into the context of the events of Bethlehem, knowing that in Christ our Savior we are claimed as God's own forever. The whole of this St. Philip's Fast and the salvation story is premised on the birth of the Child, which offers us a glimpse and hope of new life. Unfortunately, during this time each year we often fail to comprehend the reason of this special and sacred season.

During the next several weeks, we shall seek to proclaim in word and deed the possibility of new life for all humanity. By the time Orthodox Christians enter into the season of St. Philip fast and begin to prepare to greet into the world a new-born Child, the commercial world has already declared its version of the "Xmas Holidays". Being bombarded by the materialism surrounding the celebration of this "joyful season", we sometimes forget that we have entered the time of waiting, reflection and a heavy dose of joyful expectation. We are invited to fast in order to renew our faith, deepen our prayer life and prepare ourselves for a Holy Encounter with the Christ-Child.

Now more than ever, we who proclaim our love to Christ must remind the world that the Nativity season is, indeed, a proclamation of the Incarnation of Christ – the Word who "was made flesh and dwelt among us" (John 1;14) in all humility as a child in a manger – while we remember the promise of Christ to return in all His Glory at the Great and Final Judgment.

To reflect on the historical Nativity of the Christ-Child and to await His glorious return has no value unless we willing and able to nurture this birth in our hearts every single day. In order to worthily celebrate Christ's Nativity, we are invited during this fasting period to participate in the fulfillment of God's mission "to bring good news to the poor, to release the captives and all who are oppressed and to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor" (Lk. 4:18-19).

The liturgical readings of the next several weeks, leading us to the Nativity of Christ are as much about our birth as they are to prepare us for the Nativity of the Savior. They are about our identification with the events we read and hear in the Sacred Scriptures. As Orthodox Christians, we need understand that there is certain urgency about how we live out our Christian values. We are invited to come and see Him – the Christ-Child – and to see ourselves in Him. Where do we encounter weakness in our own hearts? How do we become a neighbor to those who are weak in our society? How well do we represent the caring presence of God in the world?

When we live lives characterized by love and caring, we do image that presence to the world today. The parish communities that take seriously their call to image the reality of God offer what secular institutions cannot: holiness of life, rejection of evil, compassion for the other and a willingness to share. We cannot model a better way of living without first encountering the Christ-Child – the Incarnation. This time of St. Philip's fast calls us to detach from the things and ways that are not of God and to stand with God.

As in the past, we call upon you all as our spiritual children to join us in praying fervently during this season for the leaders of the world we live in, especially for the end of the invasion of Ukraine with her boundaries intact. We ask you to also join in our prayers for all the many war-torn areas in the world - Israel, Gaza, and in other nations around the world suffering also through genocide, slavery and repression. Finally, we ask you to pray for our United States of America, that the divisions, hatred, racism and mass murders be ended. It is a secularized full strife, economic weakness world of instability. Pray for the maturity of those who lead the nations – again especially Ukraine, which is so dear to our hearts.

As we prepare ourselves for the sacred time of the Nativity of our Lord, we pray for your successful journey through St. Philip's Fast and for your willingness to accept God's Gift of Love to us all. May we all respond to the Good News of Christ's Nativity by looking not only down at the world's misery, but up to God and out to your family, friends, neighbors – and strangers.

А зараз як ніколи, ми, що проповідуємо нашу любов до Христа, мусимо нагадати світові, що Різдвяний період, насамперед, є проголошенням втілення Христа - Слово, що "стало тілом і перебувало між нами" (Ів. 1:14) з повною смиренністю як дитя у яслах - пам'ятаючи про обіцянку Христа повернутись у всій Своїй Славі під час великого та остаточного суду.

Згадуючи про історичне Різдво Христа та очікуючи Його славне повернення не має для нас ніякої цінності аж поки ми не будемо хотіти та виховувати це народження у наших серцях кожного дня. Щоб достойно відсвяткувати Різдво Христа нас закликається, під час цього періоду, взяти участь у завершені Божої місії "Добру Новину звіщати вбогим,

проповідувати полоненим визволення, відпустити на волю помучених, щоб проповідувати рік Господнього змилування" (Лк. 4:18-19)

Літургійні читання на наступних декілька тижнів, що ведуть нас до Різдва Христового, є і про наше народження, так як вони готують нас до Різдва Спасителя. В цих читаннях ідеться про наше спів-ставлення з подіями про які ми читаємо і чуємо у Святому Письмі. Як православні християни, ми повинні розуміти, що існує певне занепокоєння про те, як ми живемо вживаючи християнські чесноти. Нас закликається прийти і побачити Його - Дитя-Христа - і побачити в Ньому самих себе. Де ми знаходимо слабість у нашому серці? Як ми стаємо ближніми до тих котрі є немічні у нашому суспільстві? Чи вміло показуємо світові дбайливу Божу присутність?

Коли ми живемо своє життя осягнене любов'ю та дбайливістю, ми показуємо добрий приклад світові. Парафіяльні громади, які серйозно ставляться до свого покликання - показати Божу присутність, пропонують те, що світські установи не можуть робити, а саме: святість життя, відхилення від злого, співчуття іншим та бажання ділитися. Ми не можемо показати кращий шлях життя не беручи до уваги Дитяти-Христа - Втілення. Цей час Свято-Пилипівського посту закликає нас відкинути шляхи та дії що не від Бога і бути з Богом.

Як і в минулому, ми закликаємо вас усіх, наших духовних дітей, приєднатися до нас у ревній молитві протягом цього сезону за лідерів світу, в якому ми живемо, особливо за кінець вторгнення в Україну з її недоторканими кордонами. Ми просимо вас також приєднатися до наших молитов за всі охоплені війною території світу — Ізраїль, Газу та інші країни по всьому світу, які також страждають через геноцид, рабство та репресії. Нарешті, ми просимо вас молитися за наші Сполучені Штати Америки, щоб було покладено кінець поділам, ненависті, расизму та масовим вбивствам. Це секуляризований світ, повний чвар, економічної слабкості та політичної нестабільності. Моліться за зрілість тих, хто веде народи – знову ж таки, особливо Україну, яка так дорога нашим серцям.

Готуючись до Різдва нашого Господа ми молимось за ваше успішне проведення Свято-Пилипівського посту та за ваше бажання прийняти Божий дар любові. Нехай ми всі у відповідь на Добру Вістку Різдва Христового будемо дивитись не лиш на недолю світу, а на Бога, на нашу сім'ю, друзів, ближніх та незнайомих.

Запевняємо вас у наших молитвах та просимо ваших, ми залишаємось слугами у Господі,
